

Linwood Township will hold its Annual Meeting on Township Day, Tuesday, March 14 at 22817 Typo Creek Drive NE, Stacy, MN. The meeting starts at 7:00 PM.

Linwood Township's Annual Meeting is held every year on the second Tuesday in March. Residents of the township will meet to voice their opinions about local issues with other township residents and also vote directly on their annual tax levy - direct democracy in action. The meeting also often tackles other local issues.

Make a difference locally: Did you know that approximately 92% of Minnesota residents live in cities, which cover less than 5% of the land in the state? This leaves 8% of Minnesota residents living on 95% of the land. This disproportionate distribution of the population creates a system where the residents living in cities can vote on and create the laws and rules that govern the entire state. Township residents may be left feeling that their voice isn't being heard and that they can't make a difference in the way they live. But townships are run by your neighbors, the folks that you elect to represent you. At the Annual Meeting, you get to discuss the issues that are important to Linwood residents. You vote to set the limit of your township property taxes. Your input helps the elected officials create and maintain the community the majority of residents want to live in.

LINWOOD FIRE DEPARTMENT

2022 was a busy year for the Linwood Fire Department. We were able to return to normal operations following pandemic restrictions while seeing our call volume continued to rise. 2022 surpassed 2019 as our busiest year on record. Throughout the year, the dedicated men and women of the Linwood Fire Department worked hard to ensure the health and safety of our community.

Incident Statistics

2022 ended with a total of 280 calls for service. Of the total calls for service, 177 were medical in nature. These include calls ranging from falls to difficulty breathing, along with those of a more serious nature like diabetic reactions to cardiac emergencies. 103 incidents were categorized as fire/other. These are calls that encompass fires, motor vehicle accidents, alarms calls, and general assistance.

Below is a graph showing the breakdown of our last five years which have been our busiest.

In conclusion, 2022 was a dynamic year that not only provided us with a busy call volume but allowed firefighters to grow and succeed. Many experienced a significant "first" this year. These include first fires, first auto-extrications, and first serious medical calls. The dedication our firefighters their training and craft was evident as they performed exceptionally well on these calls, providing the best possible outcomes for those who needed our services. Not every outcome is a win, but when we get back to the station and can say we "did a good job," we improve as an organization and as individuals.

We wish everyone a safe and healthy 2023, and we will be here ready to respond quickly and professionally if called upon.

Winter is an exciting time in our parks. The hockey rink and warming shack at Four Seasons Park have been open since late December and will remain open as long as temperatures permit. There is also a classic cross-country ski trail that has been groomed at Four Seasons Park. Thank you to the many tireless volunteers that make these activities possible. Local Waters Offer Opportunities

Our community has an abundance of local waters offering recreational opportunities. Within a few minutes' drive you'll find meandering streams, recreational lakes, small hidden waters only reachable with a canoe, and more. Each offers something a little different: quiet paddling, water sports, a public beach, waterfowl hunting, or fishing. The trick is finding the spot that matches your dream "day off."

There are 30+ lakes and streams in the vicinity. Some top picks sorted by activity are:

Bird Watching -

Wetlands and open water in/ around Carlos Avery Wildlife Management Area and the Fish Lake Nature Trails are hotspots for a diversity of migratory and resident birds.

Bow fishing-

Martin, Typo, and Linwood lakes where carp are most abundant.

Fishing-

Coon, Linwood, Martin & more!

Hunting -

The managed pools in the Carlos Avery Wildlife Management Area. Or, find a spot away from homes on the other lakes.

Swimming-

Island Lake has a small beach on the East side. Coon Lake has a larger public beach. For the biggest beach in the area, head toward Lake George in the City of Oak Grove.

Quiet paddling-

Island Lake, which has no homes and rustic roadside boat access on the south side. The West Branch of the Sunrise River from Martin Lake to Co Rd 77.

Water sports-

Bigger, deeper lakes, with Coon Lake being amongst the most popular.

Winter fun-

Linwood Lake Improvement Association's Ice Bocce tournament each February.

Before leaving home, you can learn more about a lake online. A favorite information source is the MN DNR's LakeFinder website at www.dnr.state.mn.us/lakefind. Here, you'll find public accesses, fisheries data, lake depth maps, water clarity, and more.

Local waters are managed partly by the state and partly by locals. At the local level, our Sunrise River Watershed Management Organization (SRWMO) focuses on water quality. It is a collaboration of four communities (Linwood Township, East Bethel, Columbus, and Ham Lake) in the same watershed. It's built on the understanding that no one community can manage the water that freely flows amongst communities. Projects include rain gardens, stormwater ponds, rough fish management, and more. They work extensively with residents who would like to take actions on their own property that will benefit area public waters. Reminders from Township Snowplow Operators:

Plowing or otherwise placing snow in the traveled roadway is hazardous and illegal. This includes a "windrow of crumbs" when plowing your driveway across a township road. Placing snow onto the roadway is punishable under Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 160.2715. The goal is not to prosecute, but to keep

our roads safe and free of hazards.



Placing objects in the road rightof-way is illegal and dangerous. Snowmobilers have the right to use ditches for traveling in the winter.

Plowing snow piles or snow fences at the edge of the road along driveways may create visibility issues for vehicles and snowmobilers. Property owners may be liable for accidents caused by placing snow or other objects in the road right-of-way.

Garbage containers must not be placed on driving surface of roadways. Snowplow operators are responsible for clearing the road surfaces, but find it difficult to properly clean the roads when garbage containers are placed on the roadway. Residents should place their containers in their driveways and remove them after garbage has been picked up.

There are no state laws that prohibit motorists from passing a snowplow. However, it can be very dangerous to pass a plow. Snowplow operators have several blades to operate, ice control material spreaders, visibility issues, as well as traffic. Be patient and give the plows room to safely perform their job.

Attention Dog Owners

This is a reminder to all dog owners in Linwood Township that dog licenses are **required** for all dogs over 6 months of age. Proof of rabies vaccination is required.

Each license shall expire on December 31st following the date it was issued.

New residents shall be allowed 30 days from becoming a resident to obtain a dog license. Licenses may be obtained at the town hall office or by mail. License fee is \$2.00 per year.



Please note:

Any family having more than two dogs on their property must apply for a kennel license. An interim use permit must be granted before a kennel license is issued. Residents should contact the town clerk if they have more than two dogs.


