The time for Linwood residents to be heard is at the Township's Annual Meeting on Tuesday, March 9, 2021. The meeting starts at 7:00 pm. and will be held in the Town Hall at 22817 Typo Creek Drive NE, Stacy, MN.

With the uncertain times we are living in, it has been a challenge to plan for Linwood's Annual Meeting. We are trying to provide a safe meeting place, abide by mandated guidelines, and still allow residents the freedom to conduct their Annual Meeting. If you would like to participate in the meeting, you may attend in person at the Town Hall located at 22817 Typo Creek Drive NE, Stacy, MN. The township will abide with whatever restrictions are in place on the date of the Annual Meeting.

If you are unable to attend, but would like an issue to be discussed at the Annual Meeting, please contact the clerk at info@linwoodtownship.org prior to 10:00 am. on the day of the meeting or you may call into the Township phone lines during the meeting (651)462-2812 & (651)462-0501. Please note that there are only two phone lines available, so it may be difficult to get through during the meeting. We will make every effort to have your voice heard, but this is being offered as a courtesy and may not be the most effective way to participate in the Annual Meeting.

NOTE: Only persons attending in person will have the opportunity to vote on the issues. In order to be eligible to vote at the Annual Meeting, you must be a Linwood resident who was eligible to vote in the most recent election.

One option that may be utilized by eligible resident voters who attend the Annual Meeting in person is to reconvene the Annual Meeting at a later date so that more residents may be able to attend and participate.

SPRING WATER QUALITY PROTECTION



Home landscape management activities have impacts far beyond the individual property lines, neighborhoods, and town boundaries because of the way landscapes are linked together by water moving through the environment. By recognizing how your home landscape is connected to the environment, everyone can make a contribution to protecting and restoring all natural resources, especially local water quality.

Where does one start in creating an environmentally friendly home landscape? Very small changes can add up to very big changes in water quality protection.

- Recycle winter debris. Don't dump brush and leaves into streams or wetland areas. They add excess nutrients to the system and may cause flooding by blocking water flow.
- Rethink the early dose of lawn fertilizer. Avoid "weed and feed" type products that mix pesticides and fertilizers. Apply a thin layer of compost to provide a more balanced dose of nutrients for healthy lawn growth.
- Cover bare soil, don't leave it exposed. Re-seed or mulch to prevent soil erosion.
- Start a landscaping log. Spending a few minutes a week writing down what plants are growing well or having problems, what was eaten, and what yard chores take too much time will help when you are making plans for next year.

Why: Batteries and electronics can damage equipment and harm workers sorting the recycling. Batteries are particularly dangerous, especially lithium-ion batteries found in cell phones, since they can start fires when punctured.



Freezing Problems with Septic Systems

According to many septic system professionals, a winter of cold temperatures and little snow can cause freezing of onsite systems.

Even in a normal Minnesota winter, freezing can occasionally be a problem. Identifying and correcting a potential freezing problem is far easier than dealing with a frozen system. Here are a few common causes of onsite system freeze-ups.

- Lack of snow cover snow acts as a insulating blanket over the septic system.
- **Compacted snow** will not insulate as well as uncompacted snow.
- Lack of plant cover this often occurs with the instillation of a new septic in fall. A vegetative cover (grass) insulates the system and hold snow.
- Irregular use of the system When homes or cabins are unoccupied for long weekends no warm sewage is entering the system to help maintain temperatures above freezing.
- Leaking plumbing fixtures and furnace drips the slow moving water can freeze in sewer empty pipes that freeze over time.
- Cold air entering the system broken and uncapped riser pipes and manhole covers and allow cold air to enter the system.



If Your System Freezes

Contact a septic system professional. This will likely be a pumper or an installer who can help determine the cause of the problem and offer solutions. Unless the cause of the freezing is corrected, the system will refreeze next cold winter day. There are many wrong ideas about how to address a frozen septic system:

- Do NOT add antifreeze, salt or septic additives.
- Do NOT pump sewage onto the ground surface.
- Do NOT start a fire over the system
- **Do NOT** run water continually to try to unfreeze the system.

What to Know About Septic Compliance Inspections

It's always a good idea to make sure your septic system is functioning properly. It's important to the health of you, your family and the environment while you're living in your home, and to help the process go more smoothly when it's time to sell. A compliant septic system is a healthy system, and that's in the best interest of everyone.

Inspections are done by a Licensed Inspector

- Determines vertical separation of system bottom to saturated soil or bedrock.
- Evaluates absorption area for signs of surface seepage or surface discharge.
- Inspects all tanks for signs of cracks, leaks, degradation
- Inspects filters, baffles, and risers of tanks
- Measures required setbacks
- If the inspection passes, a certificate of compliance is issued.

When a Compliance Inspection is Required

- For a new or replacement SSTS.
- When altering a structure to add a bedroom.
- When a parcel having an existing system undergoes development, subdivision, or split.
- Whenever a permit or variance of any type is required for any improvement on, or use of, shoreland property.
- Upon construction of a public, church accessory building, commercial building additions over 240 square feet.
- Prior to the sale or transfer of ownership of any property that contains a septic system.

Firearms Discharges

There have been several recent complaints about the misuse of firearms in our Township. As a reminder, the applicable sections of our Township Firearms Ordinance are included for your reference.

Subd. 6. Discharge of Firearm. No person shall discharge a firearm within the Township as follows: a) Near buildings. No person shall use, fire or discharge a firearm in the



township within 300 feet of any dwelling, house, or commercial or industrial building. A person, however, may use, fire or discharge a firearm within such distance of a dwelling, house, or commercial or industrial building which is owned by that person or if the person has the written consent of the owner of the property to so use, fire, or discharge a firearm.

c) Time Restriction on Discharges. Firearm discharges which are not prohibited herein and are not associated with legal hunting activities are only permitted from one hour after sunrise to one hour prior to sunset. Further, firearms CHAPTER 7 Linwood Town Code PAGE 9 discharges which are not prohibited herein and are not associated with legal hunting activities, are only permitted on any given property for a maximum of four hours in any given 24 hour period and a maximum of 12 hours in any seven day period.

Snow Removal Policy

It is unlawful to plow snow from driveways onto or across City, County, or State roads under Minnesota Statue 160.2715(a) (1).

With the advent of Minnesota snow season comes the concern about access to work, school and business. The safety and convenience of the traveling public is a main concern of Linwood Townships Public Works Department. The goal of the Public Works Department is to have all Township streets passable within a reasonable amount of time after a snowfall has stopped.

Linwood Township does not assure a completely bare road and will not salt/sand entire sections of roadway. Users of the roadway system are reminded to exercise caution and drive with care.

Dispatching Snowplows

Linwood Township will usually not dispatch snowplows until after a snowfall has stopped. During extended periods of snowfall, exceptions may be made. Snowplows will not be sent out in situations that may be hazardous due to restricted visibility or other hazard conditions.









KEEP YOUR FAMILY SAFE FROM FIRE

To use a fire extinguisher, remember the acronym PASS:













When using space heaters:

- Never leave portable heaters and fireplaces unattended; Turn off heaters and make sure fireplace embers are extinguished before leaving the room
- If you must use a space heater, place it on a level, nonflammable surface, like ceramic tile; not on a rug or carpet, or wood
- Keep children and pets away from space heaters
- When buying a space heater, look for models that shut off automatically if the heater falls over
- Keep all flammables like paper, clothing, bedding, drapes or rugs, at least 3 feet from a space heater, stove, or fireplace







- Stay in the kitchen while you are frying, grilling, boiling or broiling food
- When simmering, baking or roasting, check the food regularly, remain in the kitchen while cooking and use a
- Keep anything that can catch fire away from your stove top

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Smoke alarms are a key part of a home fire escape plan providing early warning reducing your risk of dying in a fire. The National Fire Protection Association recommends you:

- Keep smoke alarms away from the kitchen, at least 10 feet from the stove, to reduce false alarms
- Test smoke alarms monthly
- Replace smoke alarms that are 10 or more years old
- Install smoke alarms on every level of your home, inside bedrooms and outside sleeping areas on the ceiling or high on the wall
- Use special alarms with strobe lights and bed shakers for people who are hard of hearing or deaf
- Replace batteries annually, and change the batteries in your carbon monoxide detector at the same time





Bring Your Brush, Tree, and Yard Waste to the Linwood Township Recycling Center (no charge)

State law prohibits putting brush, tree and yard waste in your garbage, (Minnesota Statutes 115A.931). Mulching naturally fertilizes and strengthens the lawn to make it more resistant to disease. Simply mow and leave the clippings where they lay.

You are required to:

- Unload your own yard waste
- Take empty bags/containers with you
- Ensure any yard waste you bring to the site is free of garbage, recyclables, or plastic.

Leaves, Grass, Tree, and Yard Waste

The following materials are accepted:

- **acorns**
- garden waste
- grass clippings (must be debagged on site)
- leaves (must be debagged on site)
- pinecones and needles
- soft-bodied green plants and weeds
- branches up to 2" in diameter
- brush & shrub trimmings
- lily pads and lake weeds
- pumpkins
- christmas trees (undecorated)



* Please unload and debag all yard/tree waste and bring all bags/containers home. Even paper or other compostable bags need to be debagged and brought home. Reusable alternatives to bags that work well are plastic garbage cans or tarps.



Take Home from the Linwood Township Recycling Center (no charge)

- woodchips from recycled brush and branches
- compost from recycled yard waste
